Meet Our Chiang Khong Daughters

Tucked in the northeast corner of Thailand across the Mekong River from Laos and two hours from FTD's Chiang Rai campus sits Chiang Khong. Chiang Khong is a growing city with new roads and bridges funded by the Chinese government. With this growth and transportation infrastructure, comes great risk of the trafficking of stateless and vulnerable people.

An existing girls' shelter in Chiang Khong was in imminent danger of closing due to lack of funding. In May, FTD came to the rescue and created the Chiang Khong Sunflower House (CKSH) under the very capable leadership of long-time and trusted collaborator Puangthon 'Too' Takan. This program is now being expanded to mirror FTD's more comprehensive and long-term program.

The CKSH is currently home to 15 girls from ethnic minority groups including the Shan, Karen, Lisu, Lahu, and Hmong. Ages 13-17, the CKSH Daughters enjoy playing musical instruments, listening to music, practicing art and sewing, and participating in LIT Club. Several times a year they visit the Chiang Rai Sunflower House campus to bond with their FTD family and to participate in FTD educational excursions.

An FTD Primer

In 2002, Jane McBride and Patty Zinkowski were traveling in Northern Thailand when they encountered a group of 15 girls at risk of human trafficking, fending for themselves in an abandoned school. They decided instantly that they would help them and the idea of Friends of Thai Daughters was born. After three years of providing financial support from friends and family, they registered Friends of Thai Daughters as a 501(c)3 charitable organization in 2005.

FTD is a prevention organization, focusing its efforts on those most **at risk** of being trafficked. We use the US State Department's annual [Trafficking in Persons \(TIP Report\)](#) as a source of information on the status of trafficking in Thailand and also for identifying risk factors.

FTD is an intensive, comprehensive and long-term program. We provide food, clothing, education, housing and emotional support in a family environment. As of 2016, we operate safe houses, or *Sunflower Houses*, in Chiang Rai and Chiang Khong for 30 Daughters ages 8-19. FTD also provides funding and emotional support and guidance for non-resident Daughters, mostly college students and graduates, assisting them with post-graduate internships and employment.

Visit Thailand

Have you always wanted to travel to Thailand and see first hand how FTD is changing lives? Now is the time!

FTD and GoInspirAsian are partnering to provide trips to Northern Thailand to raise awareness, enthusiasm and support for FTD's programs. In July, we led our first Student Service Trip for high school and college students. The students spent 13 days immersed in the culture of Chiang Rai and Chiang Khong. They volunteered at the girls' school, visited their villages, helped them with English, and even rode elephants at a refuge for rescued elephants.

The Human Trafficking Crisis

Human trafficking, a.k.a. slavery, is a \$150 billion industry impacting an estimated 45.8 million people, of which over 30 million are in the Asia Pacific Region and an estimated 425,500 in Thailand.

FTD's Daughters come from hill tribe villages along the Lao and Burmese borders where ethnic minority girls are most at risk of being trafficked. The primary risk factor is their lack of legal documentation, which renders them "stateless." Many have been orphaned, abandoned or neglected by families leaving them vulnerable.

FTD's Sunflower Houses are often the first time they have encountered indoor plumbing, electricity, sufficient food and a loving and safe shelter.

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FTD Expansion Underway

With the Chiang Rai Sunflower Campus at full capacity, the satellite Sunflower House established in Chiang Khong and LIT Clubs in full swing at both programs, FTD has completed Phases I and II of its expansion. Phase III plans include establishing a third Sunflower House in the border town of Mae Sai (see photo on left), upgrading the Chiang Khong Sunflower House with an enclosed study and activity room and replacing roofs in Chiang Rai.

With three Sunflower Houses strategically located throughout the Golden Triangle (see map on right), FTD will have the capacity to reach up to 45 resident Daughters and 30 non-resident Daughters for a total of 75 girls and young women annually.
